





Only the track of one lone skier transcends thy hidden ponds,


Ponds which soon will reflect countless youthful faces, Storing memories for future eternities;

HAUDENOSAUNEE 19

We of the Extended Tribe

Buffalo Lodge 19, whose name was soon changed to Sisilija, was formed in 1925 in a brief ceremony at Camp Rotary on Lake George. Sisilija became the first lodge in upstate New York and the nineteenth lodge established in the United States. Sisilija hosted the 9th National conference at Camp Rotary in 1931 where the council executive was elected National Chief. In the years that followed, Sisilija took a great interest in Scouting program & activities of the Schenectady County Council, especially the newly formed Camp Boyhaven. The early years of the lodge were spent helping other lodges get started. At the request of the National OA and area councils, lodge members and the executives spent a considerable amount of time teaching the principles, rules, and procedures of the OA. As a result, Sisilija became the "Mother Lodge' of Sec. 2A (The area that used to be Section 2A is currently covered Haudenosaunee Lodge 19 and Loon Lodge 364). Sisilija Lodge hosted conclaves in 1953, 1962, 1970, 1975, 1982, and 1988.

Haudenosaunce Lodge is administered by six chapters, and is affiliated with the Twin Rivers Council, which is headquartered in Albany, N.Y.

Otahnagon Lodge is located in Baden Powell Council, Binghamton, New York. It was founded in 1939 and celebrates its 63rd year of cheerful service. Its totem pole is the Pine Tree and the name Otahnagon means, "camp in the pines".

The lodge has provided the skills and manpower for both the construction of several facilities at Camp Tuscarora and for the general maintenance necessary to open and close camp each year.

Otahnagon Lodge has a successful dance team and has won conclave dance competitions for several years.

Baden Powell council was formed in 1975 by the merger of Louis Agassiz Fuertes Council (Thompkins/Tioga Counties, N.Y.) and Tioughnioga Council (Cortland City, N.Y.).

As of Jan. 1, 1998 the Baden Powell Council and the Susquenango Council (Broome & Chenango County, N.Y. and Susquenana County Pennsylvania) merged with the resulting Council retaining old Baden Powell Council service centre in Dryden, N.Y.

Founded on June 5, 1999 Kayanernh-Kowa is the product of the merger of Gosh Wha Gono Lodge 120 and Nischa Nitis Lodge 410. Kayanernh-Kowa has sent delegates to the National Leadership Summit in Colorado, NE-3B Conclave at Camp Kingsley, 2000 National Order of the Arrow Conference in Knoxville, Tennessee, and 2000 NE-3B Conclave at Camp Barton.

Kayanernh-Kowa has had many successful fall and Spring Fellowship at Camp Woodland and Camp Portaferry.

The first Trade-O-Ree was held at Watertown, N.Y. in 2000 and was a great success.

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Loon Lodge was organized in 1947 with twenty-nine charter members who were inducted by the Ritual team from Wakpominee Lodge. The Lodge, chartered through the Adirondack Council, has its headquarters in Plattsburgh, N. Y. It services Franklin, Essex and Clinton Counties, an area of more than 5,000 square miles.

Camp Bedford, located near Malone in Franklin County, consists of woodland, lakes and streams. It is home to may wildlife, including Loons, American Bald Eagle, Beavers and Otters. Every spring & fall, Bedford is the meeting place for the Lodge's work weekend and Brotherhood ceremony.

Every year Loon Lodge serves the community by helping in the many fund drives held in the area. They also serve the Council in various ways. The Lodge has helped in the many constructions and repairs at Camp Bedford.

Loon Lodge created and maintains the War of 1812 National Historic Trail in Plattsburgh. The trail is 7 miles in length, and retraces the historic footsteps of the Battle of Plattsburgh. Scouts can earn a trail patch and medal. http://www.warof1812trail.com

Loon Lodge has been the host to the 1961, 1969, 1977, 1983, 1992, 1997 and the current 2002 NE Section 3B Conclaves and has been instrumental in the planning of many others as several of their members usually hold a seat on the Council of Chiefs.

ONTERORAUS 402

On June 9, 1948, it was regularly moved and approved by the executive board of the Otschodela Council, that a lodge of the Order of the Arrow be organized, and its program be incorporated as part of camping and activities program of the council. Accordingly, elections were held each week of the summer camp and by this method, the candidates were selected for membership.

Over the course of the years, the lodge has participated in area conferences and has been assigned to several areas during our history. We have been in Area 2D, 2H, 2A, 2D, 3Cand now in 3B. Crumhorn Mt. Camp and the Onteroraus Lodge have hosted many Order of the Arrow Conclaves.

In 1961 a new circle was prepared and is currently the present ordeal circle. Several brothers traveled to the original circle at Treasure Island and soil and ashes were spread on the ordeal ring. Hereafter, there will always be a bit of Treasure Island in our ring.

A FACT SHEET ON THE COMMON LOON

HOW LONG DO LOONS LIVE?

Individuals live an estimated 15-30 years.

WHAT DO LOONS EAT?

Loons feed by light; prey is always captured live and swallowed underwater. They eat fish (trout, perch, minnows, sunfish and bullheads) but will take frogs crayfish, salamanders and sometimes-aquatic vegetation.

WHERE DO LOONS NEST?

Nest sites are always near water's edge, usually in protected, shallow bays. Some sites are very exposed while others are in thick vegetation.

WHAT ARE NESTS MADE OF?

The nest is simply a pile of mud and vegetation with a shallow depression in the middle.

HOW MANY EGGS ARE LAYED?

Usually 2 large eggs are layed one day apart. They are olive-green with dark brown spots. WHEN DO EGGS HATCH?

Both the male and the female share incubation duties for 27 to 31 days. 12-24 hours after hatching, the chicks leave the nest. Chicks begin diving for some of their food during the first week, but depend on adults for food for the first month. At 6-8 weeks, the young have reached full adult size and are on their own. First flight is at about 11 weeks of age.

DO LOONS HAVE ANY PREDATORS?

Raccoons, gulls, crows, ravens, skunks, otter and mink all prey upon loon eggs. Large fish and snapping turtles prey upon chicks. Most predation is on eggs.

ARE LOONS STRONG SWIMMERS?

Loons are quick and agile divers and swimmers. Most dives last under one minute, but have been known to last up to five minutes.

WHAT ABOUT LOONS IN FLIGHT?

Loons are strong fliers, but do find it quite difficult to become airborn. They need about 1/8 mile of open water for a runway.

DO LOONS MIGRATE?

Yes. Autumn Migration starts in October to November. Loons winter along the Atlantic coast and return to New York in April or May.

WHAT ARE THE CALLS MADE BY LOONS?

Loons have four main calls: the tremolo, wall, yodel, and hoot. The tremolo is a general call which signals alarm, annoyance, worry or anxiety. Presence of people often illicit tremolo calls, especially when boaters come too close. The wall is an interaction call, often used to reestablish contact with mate. The yodel is a territorial call given only by males. Use of the yodel peaks in June. The hoot is a location call that is used between family members.
